Those of you who caught the Kennedys' show last April will certainly remember Mark D. Conklin who opened for them. Mark knows how to write a good song and how to put it across. His lyrics are sharp, ironic, and clever. His subjects are interesting, innovative, and seen from a novel perspective. And he has that rare ability for a literary songwriter to rock out with the best. He is also the recipient of numerous songwriting awards including the Independent Music Award for Country Song of the Year for 2010. Our opener Roia Rafieyan grew up in Iran, and studied classical guitar when she moved to the States. That training shows in her complex and fluid guitar work backing up her well-written songs. There's compassion, a gentle humor, and heart in those songs, and she's a treat to listen to.

#### Friday, 4/20: Split Bill — Don Henry and Craig Bickhardt

Tonight a pair of brilliant Nashville songwriters share our stage: Years as a successful Nashville songwriter have honed **Don Henry** into a powerful master of his craft. He is heartfelt, literate, and funny, and manages to defy convention and still achieve commercial success. His own Puckish character creates even more wonderful characters for his songs like "Harley" and "Mr. God". "Beautiful Fool " stopped the show at the Philadelphia Folk Festival.

As a Nashville songwriter, Craig Bickhardt has written over 800 songs for such luminaries as Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson and Tony Rice. He is also a strong performer of these songs, with powerful guitar work and emotional delivery. Both men are also accomplished instrumentalists and vocalists as well as great writers. They will be sharing the stage, swapping songs, and backing each other up as appropriate.

Orrin Star is an ex-Winfield Champion flatpicking guitarist as well as a mandolinist. He applies those talents to bluegrass and Celtic classics, swing tunes, novelty songs, some originals, and a wide variety of other music. He's also a charming and very funny quy on stage. Note: The Accidentals, originally scheduled to headline this date have had to cancel. **Our opener tonight is Fibonacci.** The Folk Project has always been a fertile breeding ground for bands, and this one combines some of our best musicians: Christine DeLeon (vocals), Kathy Haynie (keyboard) Andy Koenig (bass & wind-synthesizer) and Pat Hickey (quitar). The band is essentially a top-of-the-line bar band, performing the hit music of the members' youths. "House of the Rising Smoke on the Stairway to Free Bird".

The Minstrel is an acoustic music concert series run by the Folk Project, a non-profit folk music and arts organization. We use the facilities of the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship, 21 Normandy Heights Road, Morristown, NJ, We hold shows almost every Friday, year round, and the second Friday of the month is usually an open stage/audition night. The music we present is "folk" music in its broadest sense. That is, in addition to traditional American and ethnic "folk" music (in its purist definition), we welcome music of contemporary, primarily acoustic songwriters, and other types of music more folkie in attitude than in content. Shows start at 8pm; dress is casual. We serve coffee, teas, and baked goods. There is no alcohol or tobacco on the premises. Admission is inexpensive; on our regular Friday concerts we ask \$7.00 on your way in, and, if you feel the show was worth it, an additional amount at your discretion on the way out, which goes to supplement what we pay the feature performer. ### And the Award Goes To...

The New Jersey Folk Festival announced *Sing Out!* columnist and advisory board member Roger Deitz is the recipient of its 2012 Lifetime Achievement Award, to be awarded at Festival on April 28. Held on the Eagleton Institute lawn, Douglass College of Rutgers University, the festival highlights the traditions and diversity of the people of New Jersey — with this year's festival focusing on the music and culture of Bulgaria. Music Director Kathy DeAngelo said the NJFF Lifetime Achievement Award will be bestowed on Deitz in recognition of Roger's "...long-time efforts to promote folk music in New Jersey and around the country both as a musician and singer as well as a writer for *Sing Out!* and other publications." Festival Director Dr. Angus Kress Gillespie of the University's American Studies Department added, "New Jersey native Roger Deitz is the recipient of the New Jersey Folk Festival award for his distinguished contributions to the Folk Music of New Jersey, and for writing a wealth of columns and feature stories appearing in the national folk music press for nearly forty years."

A celebratory cake was consumed at the end of the meeting and congratulations echoed into the night.

Festival co-chair Mark Schaffer reported that the Festival hive is buzzing. Registration has begun based on the sold-out pre-registration list. The family initiative has been a success as many families with children and teens have pre-registered. A workshop schedule is in the works and new features are being planned to facilitate our move to the new site. Pre-registrants should look for an email from the Festival Committee and respond ASAP to complete their registration.


In other committee news:
