2017 Board of Directors

The Nominating Committee for the 2017 Board consisted of Barrett Wilson, Lori Falco, Mike Agranoff, Jay Wilensky, and Deborah Graham as Chairman. We were charged with proposing the makeup of the 2017 Board of Directors for the Folk Project. Our recommendations are shown in the following paragraphs and table.

Trustees: There are nine Trustees on the Board serving rotating three-year terms. The three Trustees whose terms expire this year are Mitch Radler, Grover Kemble, and Allan Kugel. The Nominating Committee renominates Allan to run for a new three-year term, whereas Mitch and Grover have asked to step down. The Committee nominates Ken Brody and Evelyn McNally to serve for the other two three-year terms. Any FP member may nominate any other member to stand for election for Trustee. President: Barrett Wilson is stepping down as President and offering to serve as Vice President. The Committee nominates Steve Humphreys to serve as President.

Secretary: Lindsey Meyer has asked to relinquish the Secretary position so that she can focus on the newly developing Archiving Committee. The Committee nominates Jay Wilensky to serve as Secretary.





History of NJ Folk Music

A book is coming out this month that may interest our readers, presenting the 300-year history



of folk music in New Jersey. It is titled "New Jersey Folk Revival Music: History & Tradition," and was written by Michael Gabriele, who has several other NJ history books to his credit.

A note about terminology: the author distinguishes between "folk revival music," the commercial, popular folk tradition, and the more academic study of "folk music," defined as an element of cultural anthropology. The book focuses on the former.

New Jersey has been home to numerous milestones that have shaped folk revival music as an art form. The book examines the evolution of folk revival music in New Jersev and its effects on local history and culture, as well as how it has changed lives—those on stage and those in the audience.

Folk Project Board Meeting • November 1, 2016 Board Meeting: The Summary

The meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order at 8pm at the home of Allan Kugel and Cecilia Rowedder in Highland Park.

Present: Kathi Caccavale, Joanne Cronin, Lois DeRitter, Grover Kemble, Allan Kugel, Elizabeth Lachowicz, Lindsey Meyer, Chris Riemer, Jay Wilensky, and Barrett Wilson (officers and trustees); Mike Agranoff, Ken Brody, Christine DeLeon, Lori Falco, Paul Fisher, Deborah Graham, George Otto, Mitch Radler, Pam Robinson, Ed Roffman, Mark Schaffer, and Leigh Walker (committee chairs). **Absent**: Pat Brangs, Mike Del Vecchio, Bob McNally. **Guests**: Olga Alvarez, Sandy Jackson, Barbara Moo, Tom Taylor. The October minutes were approved, and Chris reported that our finances are in fine shape.

OLD BUSINESS

The board voted to accept the **Nominating Committee**'s slate of candidates for 2017. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor prior to the election at December's membership meeting. Please join us at the Chimney Rock Inn on Dec. 6 (see details elsewhere in this newsletter). Our board meetings are always fun but the annual meeting really swings. Come on out!

The Workers' Compensation Committee presented its final report and recommended retaining our workers' comp insurance. The board voted to accept the recommendation, and Lori will begin working with insurance agents familiar with workers' comp. Even though we have no paid employees, NJ law presents enough ambiguities that we decided it's prudent to continue coverage. We extended a huge thank you to the five committee members, who went above and beyond on this difficult legal issue.

NEW BUSINESS

We voted to spend \$800 to subsidize Pam Robinson and Bob Safranek to attend the **Folk Alliance International** (FAI) in Kansas City in February. They'll learn better ways to produce FP events and will scout for performers for Special Concerts and NJ Uke Fest. We already provide certain subsidies for board members to attend NERFA (Northeast Regional Folk Alliance), which is affiliated with FAI.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership chair Eddie suggested a software purchase for the new chair, which grew into a discussion about the possibilities of storing data on a shared secure server, FileMaker cloud hosting, or something similar. Currently, committees such as Membership, Getaway, Minstrel, and Swingin' Tern maintain separate databases, making info sharing difficult. We'll pursue this in 2017.

Mark reported a very successful fall **Getaway**. They received the best survey response ever, with over half of attendees responding. A big hooray and thank you to all the volunteers who make Getaway possible.

The Cubs are up 7–0.

Minstrel Staffing chair Deborah reported several new volunteers, a welcome response to her pleas for help. The Halloween show produced an estimated \$500 profit and featured a full schedule of seasonal music and poetry in addition to excellent donated food.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:33pm.
