3/6: Charlie Zahm, Bill Kelly

With his powerful baritone voice, CHARLIE ZAHM sings of the sea, of his Canadian background and of his Scottish roots. His voice evokes memories of Stan or Garnet Rogers. Most of his music is original, but many folks who hear his songs take them to be traditional tunes of the area, nearly indistinguishable from music that may have been worked over by generations of traditional singers. For Charlie, there is no higher compliment. In addition to 6- and 12-string guitar, Charlie plays mandolin, banjo, and whistle, and will be accompanied by fiddler Tad Marks. Opener BILL KELLY is a skilled and comfortable songwriter, who might be described as sounding like an acoustic Bruce Springsteen. His songs touch on the Common Man and reach Everyman.

3/20: Michael Smith, Bread & Bones

MICHAEL SMITH is the singer-songwriter most well known as the author of "Margaret and the Dutchman." But that song cannot be called representative of Michael's writing any more than can any of his other songs. Michael reinvents himself with every new song, and the only common bond between them is the excellence and craftsmanship of his work. He can be irreverent, tender, wordy, hilarious, and sentimental in turn. And in all modes, he is hugely entertaing. Our opening act is the Vermont-based songwriting trio BREAD AND BONES. They have a distinctly classic sound. With spare yet classy arrangements, tasty lead guitar work, and solid harmonies, they present new songs that sound like you've heard them before.

3/27: Cindy Mangsen & Steve Gillette, The Belles Trio

Long-time Minstrel favorites CINDY MANGSEN AND STEVE GILLETTE might be considered the bellwether of the type of act that graces our stage. Relaxed, informal, and folksy, they nonetheless present a performance with great professionalism and skill. Their material ranges from traditional ballads to original songs, to covers from anybody from the Beatles to the Berrymans. They are both great singers and guitarist, and also play banjo, dulcimer, concertina and fiddle. The music of THE BELLES TRIO centers around the outstanding voices of Caroline Cutroneo, Marie Elena, and Mara Levine. These women apply beautiful vocal arrangements to traditional songs, folk standards, and their own compositions. They sometimes make the group's name inaccurate by inviting guest instrumentalists onstage to make it a 4- or 5- part trio.

Registration is now open for the Spring '09 festival and the response has been fantastic. As of February 15, we've had 51 people register and by the time you read this, the Commons will be sold out. But you still have plenty of options.

The Cabins at Star Lake are conveniently located a short walk from all of the activities. The rooms contain single cots – no upper bunks. And the shared bathrooms can accommodate several people at once, so you probably won't have to wait. Plus, you'll save a little money.

If you enjoy your creature comforts, you can stay in the hotel-like Lodge for only a slight increase over the Commons prices. You get a room with twin beds and a private bath and plenty of peace and quiet. The Lodge is a bit over a mile from the concert hall, just a five- minute drive. We will reserve choice parking spaces for you so that you can come and go easily. Or you may want to buy a weekend pass and commute. Star Lake is only a half hour from Morristown. You can save money and stay in your own bed.
