Beppe Gambetta House Concert

Folk Project favorite Beppe Gambetta will perform on his Summer 2009 North American tour at the home of Mark and Robin Schaffer on Sunday, July 5 at 7pm. Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$20 at the door. You can purchase your tickets at The Minstrel or www.folkproject.org.

Beppe, a native of Genova Italy, has developed a unique style he calls this "koiné" (fusion) where country, bluegrass and Ligurian tradition, emigration songs and folk ballads, mandolins and harp guitars not only co-exist but interact, weaving a deep dialog unaware of any rigid classification.

Beppe's performances stand out for their intimate emotions, communication, sobriety and humor. His is an inspired music that modestly avoids relying solely on his high level of technical excellence, but reveals the innermost feelings of of a brilliant, playful mind that is always exploring and innovating while staying firmly rooted in tradition.

Acoustic Concert Series presented by The Folk Project



Fri., July 3: Mike Agranoff and Carl Croce

As the Minstrel's Program Chairman, MIKE AGRANOFF has been its public face for over 30 years. Many regular attendees have heard snippets of music from him at an Open Stage or in informal music sessions offstage. But he's also a regularly touring seasoned performer, and a full set from him can be pretty impressive. His prodigious skills on guitar, concertina, and piano are matched to a wide variety of music. Expect anything from irreverent parodies to traditional ballads; from blazing dance tunes to Joplin piano rags; from great chorus songs to his signature spoken-word recitations. In addition to some old favorites, expect brand new and long-abandoned songs from his vast repertoire along with musical help from some of the Folk Project's best musicians. CARL CROCE is also a Folk Project member. He's known as the big guy with the big voice, and the big guitar. He belts out blues and folk favorites with strong guitar accompaniment.



Fri., June 10: Open Stage

The Minstrel provides this service to our local musical community and passing traveling professionals to be heard by the public and maybe to be booked for a future show. Those who wish to perform at the OPEN STAGE should visit www.folkproject.org/fp_minstopen.html. Those who wish to see and hear a wide variety of performers should attend. (And if this month's Open Stage is anything like last months, it will be an outstanding show for sheer entertainment.)

Fri., July 17: Bucky Pizzarelli and Ken Lelen

This will be a must-see night for guitar aficionados. Literally a living legend, BUCKY PIZZARELLI has performed with everyone from Les Paul to Stephane Grappelli to Benny Goodman to Tiny Tim. Playing an unusual 7-string archtop guitar, Pizzarelli drew his influences from Django Reinhardt, Freddie Green and George Van Eps. In his 80s now, he has not slowed down an iota, and continues to blaze trails in the jazz guitar world. Our opener KEN LELEN also makes points in the guitar world by playing vintage songs on vintage guitars. His collection of instruments may not be as large as his collection of songs, but many of them are considerably older than the material from the '20's and '30's he delivers with great charm, and a wealth of knowledge and back-stories on the material

Fri., July 24: The Minstrel's 34th Birthday Party

Tonight the Minstrel celebrates not only its anniversary, but the musicians of the Folk Project, the organization that has sustained it for 34 years. The show will be comprised of 3 to 4 dozen Folk Project member musicians, who were combined into randomly chosen duos and trios about 3 weeks earlier. Each group performs one number they have worked up in the interim. It's a chance to see the seasoned pros and the kitchen musicians performing together in demonstration of the spirit that has been the lifeblood of the Project since its inception. Tonight only \$8.00 admission includes birthday cake and other refreshments.

Fri., July 31: Toby Walker and Beaucoup Blue

The Blues Revue summed it up neatly. TOBY WALKER is "...a brilliant remarkable guitarist. A pinch of Piedmont, a dash of Delta, a solid Chicago undercurrent minus the amplification, but not the electricity." At home with both wooden and steel guitars, Toby plays the classics as well as his own songs with an open style and a dash of humor. Opener BEAUCOUP BLUE is the father-son team of David and Adrian Mowry. On flat top and resonator guitars, they perform original songs and blues classics, along with some distinctive treatments of music from the doo-wop era.

The Minstrel is an acoustic music concert series run by the Folk Project, a non-profit folk music and arts organization. We use the facilities of the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship, 21 Normandy Heights Road, Morristown, NJ. We hold shows almost every Friday, year round, and the second Friday of the month is usually an open stage/audition night. The music we present is "folk" music in its broadest sense. That is, in addition to traditional American and ethnic "folk" music (in its purist definition), we welcome music of contemporary, primarily acoustic songwriters, and other types of music more folkie in attitude than in content. Shows start at 8pm; dress is casual. We serve coffee, teas, and baked goods. There is no alcohol or tobacco on the premises. Admission is inexpensive; on our regular Friday concerts we ask \$7.00 on your way in, and, if you feel the show was worth it, an additional amount at your discretion on the way out, which goes to supplement what we pay the feature performer. FP MEMBER-MUSICIANS:

Perform in the Minstrel's Birthday Show

For about 25 of the Minstrel's 34 year history, FP member-musicians have observed its anniversary with this unique home-grown celebration. This show consists of a series of performances by groups of FP members combined in randomly-chosen duos and trios. The members of the groups may be of all skill levels, different musical genres and instrumentation; their common denominator is that they are members of the Folk Project, enjoy making music, and want to take part in this celebration of who we are.

We invite all member-musicians/singers to take part in this show. Here's how it works: groups are set up at the FP July 4th picnic, which takes place on (you guessed it) Sat., July 4 at the home of Ed and Robin Roffman, 11 Butternut Road, Randolph (more details on page 1). Everyone who wants to take part in the show puts their name on an index card. The cards are shuffled and dealt out into about 20 piles to form the groups. The groups then have the next three weeks to work up one number per group, to be performed at the Minstrel on Friday, July 24.

To take part in the show:

- **YOU MUST BE A CURRENT FP MEMBER** If your membership has lapsed or will lapse before August, you must renew. Check your newsletter mailing label or inquire at Membership@FolkProject.org if you're not sure.
- **TRY TO BE AT THE PICNIC**, and be able to commit rehearsal time in the intervening weeks. (See below if you want to be in the show, but can't make the picnic.)
- **AS FAR AS MUSICAL ABILITY**, that's a matter of your own judgment. If you're reasonably comfortable in playing a song in front of friends, well that's what you'll be doing. I've seen otherwise amateurs rise to the occasion countless times.
- **YOU CAN BE IN AS MANY GROUPS AS YOU FEEL YOU CAN COMMIT TO**. Simply put your name in the hat as many times as the number of groups you wish to be in. One or two groups is common.
- **THE DRAWING WILL BE at 3:30pm** at the picnic, and you can use the rest of the afternoon to get a head start on choosing your music and rehearsing. (Start thinking of good ensemble songs now, so you can offer suggestions when your group is chosen)
- **YOU MAY ADD ADDITIONAL MEMBERS TO YOUR RANDOM GROUP** at your choice, provided that these "ringers" are also current Project members, and that the originally randomly chosen people are featured as well.
- **FOR YOU MORE ACCOMPLISHED MUSICIANS WHO HAVE NOT BEEN PUTTING YOUR NAME IN THE HAT, BUT COUNTING ON JOINING OTHER GROUPS OF YOUR CHOICE AS "RINGERS"**: Yeah, you can do that, but it really does go against the spirit of the event. C'mon, play fair and take your chances.
- **IF YOU REALLY CAN'T BE AT THE PICNIC** but want to be in the show, call (973) 335-9489 or e-mai Minstrel@FolkProject.org before the 4th. If you get an answering machine, leave name, phone, address, e mail, and **HOW MANY GROUPS YOU WANT TO BE IN**. If you don't think others will be familiar to you, also leave information on instruments you play or other musical skills. (sing harmony, etc.) The other members of your group will contact you to let you know who they are, and set up rehearsals.

However, please try to make the picnic. You put other members of your groups at a disadvantage if you're not there to be involved in the choice of music and first rehearsal time, and that usually means an extra rehearsal needed in the intervening weeks before the actual show. Besides which, the picnic is great fun.

So that's it. I hope you can be part of this. See you at the show and at the picnic.
