Minstrel Start Time Moved to 7:45

The Morristown Unitarian Fellowship has received noise complaints from the neighborhood residences. As a result, the Morristown Zoning Board has issued new regulations about late night events held there. The complaints have come from other activities at MUF besides the Minstrel, but the Zoning Board decree does affect our operations.

The one change that will most affect all attendees is that starting in July, our show time will be moved up from 8pm to 7:45pm. We are also making other format changes, including changing the Opening Act's appearance from two 20-minute sets to a single 30 minute set to open the show. And our projected show ending time will be moved up to 10:30.

None of us are happy with this development, but we felt it the best compromise to deal with an unhappy reality. In the end, I don't think it will adversely affect the Minstrel.

Kathy has a wonderful home for this kind of thing so let's gather there with our instruments and voices for music and pot luck sharing (although please take any leftovers home with you). Plenty of parking around the cul-de-sac but we'll leave the driveway open for dropping off instruments, etc. Please walk around the back to enter via the spectacular deck where you will be greeted by jammers and singers (weather permitting). Also, it would be good to remove your shoes and come prepared for the "Who Has The Silliest Slippers" contest to be judged by the first volunteer who wants the job. (C'mon, you know you want to do this!)

FROM POINTS NORTH: Route 287 South to Exit 17 (exit on the LEFT) to Rt. 202 South. At the Somerville Circle, take the third exit to Rt. 206 South for 4.7 miles. Right onto Rt. 601 (a/k/a Blawenburg Belle Mead Rd.) for 3.2 miles. Right onto Grandview Rd. for 1.2 miles. Left onto Fairview Road. First right onto Pineview Court. FROM POINTS EAST: Rt. 78 West to Exit 29, Rt. 287 South. Follow directions from Rt. 287 South above. FROM POINTS SOUTH: NJ Turnpike North to Exit 8 Rt. 133 (a/k/a Heightstown Bypass) for 4 miles. Right on to Rt. 571 (a/k/a Princeton Heightstown Rd.) for 4.6 miles. Bear right onto Washington Road for 2.3 miles (straight at circle in Princeton at Rt. 1). Left on Nassau Street (changes to Stockton Street) for 0.6 miles. Right onto Rt. 604 (a/k/a Great Rd. and becomes Rt. 601 Blawenburg Belle Mead Rd.) for 6.2 miles. Left onto Grandview Rd. Follow directions from Grandview Rd. above. FROM POINTS WEST: 78 East to Exit 29 (Rt. 287 South). Follow directions above from 287 South.

Fri., Jul. 1: Shun Ng with The Eclectic Consort

Guitar fans who saw Beppe Gambetta back in January will certainly remember **Shun Ng** (pronounced, "Ing") who opened for him. He is an exciting and innovative young guitarist making a splash in the guitar world today. With great virtuosity on his radically designed guitar, he performs his own music as well as some unexpected covers of unlikely, and yet familiar, songs. His style is part jazz, part blues, maybe even a little disco, and 100% joy. He is exciting to watch and brilliant to hear.

The **Eclectic Consort** consists of Folk Project members John and Kris Lamb and Andy Koenig (and special guest for this performance, keyboardist Kathy Haynie). With backgrounds in early music, and tastes as wide as their name implies, they come on stage armed with dozens of strange instruments ranging from Renaissance shawms and krumhorns to 21st Century synthesizers. And it's anybody's guess what will come out of these implements. Whatever, it's bound to be interesting and fun.

Fri., Jul. 15: Reeds, Rhythm and All That Brass with Bill Brandon

Launched in 1973, **Reeds, Rhythm and All That Brass** is a 17-piece band playing the classic American Songbook repertoire of the Big Band era and beyond. Comprising professional and semi-professional players, they perform the music made famous by Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Glen Miller, Frank Sinatra, and the like. The band includes Folk Project members Jeff Rantzer and Hen3ry Nerenberg on trombone, Darrell Courtley on sax, and Jay Wilensky on vocals.

Opener **Bill Brandon** manages to pack a big band of his own into a single hollow-body electric guitar. He specializes in solo guitar arrangements of jazz and swing standards.

Fri., Jul. 22: John Gorka with Nancy Beaudette

John Gorka is perhaps the quintessential iconic singer-songwriter of the 80's folk scene. Hailing from New Jersey, but forged in the Greenwich Village Fast Folk scene, he honed his craft and persona into an unmistakable image. The shy, wry, insightful, and yes, sensitive singer-songwriter has been copied, mocked, and parodied. But, the old coat he wove still fits, and still suits him well. The old songs ring as true as they ever did, and the new ones are just as good.

Nancy Beaudette's first exposure to music was the Scots, Irish, and French-based fiddle music of her native rural Cornwall, Ontario, to which she played guitar accompaniment. She went on to write her own songs, which have been winning contests and awards for almost 20 years. The songs tell stories and paint portraits of characters, all with a palpable warmth and a smile in the voice.

Signing Up for the Birthday Show

The Folk Project has, from its inception, been in large part an organization of music makers. I would estimate that roughly 1/3 of our members sing or play an instrument at some level. And since the early 80s, the Minstrel has been celebrating its birthday with a show that could only be held by an organization with so many member musicians: The Birthday Show. If you sing or play, we'd like you to be part of that show.

Here's how it works: The show will take place on Friday, July 29 at the Minstrel. It will consist of a series of performances by groups comprising Folk Project members combined in randomly-chosen duos and trios. The individual members of the groups may be of any skill level, different musical genres, different instrumentation. Musical groups are set up at the Folk Project's Independence Day picnic, which takes place on Monday, July 4th at the home (and pool) of Ed Roffman, 11 Butternut Road in Randolph. (More details on the picnic are on [page 2](#).) Everyone who wants to take part in the show puts their name on an index card. The cards are shuffled, and then dealt out into about 20 piles to form the groups. The groups then have the next 3 weeks to work up one number per group, to be performed at the Minstrel on Friday, July 29.

Details:

- ❖ YOU MUST BE A CURRENT FOLK PROJECT MEMBER If your membership has lapsed, or will lapse in July, you must renew. Check your newsletter mailing label or inquire at Membership@FolkProject.org if you're not sure. (And if you know a non-member musician who would like to take part, they can always join the Project.)
- ❖ It's not required, but TRY TO BE AT THE PICNIC on the 4th. (See below if you want to be in the show, but can't make the picnic.)
- ❖ YOU MUST BE WILLING TO COMMIT THE REHEARSAL TIME and travel necessary to work up your song with your group in the intervening time between the picnic and the show. IMPORTANT! If you put your name in the hat, that's a commitment to whomever you're paired with to see it through. If you back out, you've left your bandmate unable to take part in the show.
- ❖ AS FAR AS MUSICAL ABILITY, That's a matter of your own judgment. If you're reasonably comfortable in playing a song in front of friends, well that's what you'll be doing. I've seen otherwise amateurs rise to the occasion countless times. If you sing, but do not play an instrument, that's cool. Your bandmates can supply the accompaniment. (See next paragraph, too.)
- ❖ YOU MAY ADD ADDITIONAL MEMBERS TO YOUR RANDOM GROUP at your choice, provided that these "ringers" are also current Project members, and that the originally randomly chosen people are featured as well.
- ❖ YOU CAN BE IN AS MANY GROUPS AS YOU FEEL YOU CAN COMMIT TO. Simply enter as many index cards as the number of groups you wish to be in. One or two groups is common.
- ❖ THE DRAWING WILL BE DONE AT 4PM AT THE PICNIC, and you can use the rest of the afternoon to get a head start on choosing your music and rehearsing. (Start thinking of good ensemble songs now, so you can have some suggestions for your groups when they're chosen.)
- ❖ IF YOU REALLY CAN'T BE AT THE PICNIC but you want to be in the show, you can do that by e-mailing Minstrel@FolkProject.org or calling 973/335-9489 before the 4th. If you get my voicemail, leave your name, phone, address, e-mail, and HOW MANY GROUPS YOU WANT TO BE IN. I'll make out your index card(s) and put 'em in the hat for you. If you don't think other members will be familiar with you, also leave information on instruments you play or other musical skills (sing harmony, etc.). The other members of your group will contact you to let you know who they are and to set up rehearsals. However, please try to make the picnic. You put other members of your groups at a disadvantage if you're not there to be involved in the choice of music and first rehearsal time, and that usually means an extra rehearsal needed in the intervening weeks before the actual show. Besides which, the picnic is great fun.

So that's it. I hope you can be part of this. See you at the show and at the picnic.

The May minutes were approved, and Chris reported that our finances are on solid ground.

OLD BUSINESS

Workers' Compensation Insurance: The board approved a \$500 expenditure for legal advice regarding our coverage.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Getaway: The Spring Getaway was excellent and again sold out early. Mark reported working on closing the gap between dropouts and the waiting list: people register so early that some drop out, so the waiting list really DOES get used. Tickets for the fall Getaway will go on sale on July 15. Mark, Barbara, and Lori received applause for their heroic current and past Getaway chair dedication, successes, and sacrifices.

Minstrel Booking: Mike reported that the parking lot construction at the Unitarian Fellowship will probably not take place in the immediate future, so parking at the Minstrel will not be affected any time soon. He said that we have been asked to minimize post-concert noise so as to avoid bothering neighbors.

Renovations at MUF

Some of you are aware that the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship, the home of the Minstrel, has embarked upon an expansion campaign which, when complete, will make significant repairs and upgrades to the existing building and add a large separate hall to accommodate weddings and other functions. This is planned in several stages and over the course of roughly a decade. The recent upgrades to the Meeting Room and installation of a new sound system were some of the first steps in that plan. Next on the list will be a complete reconstruction of the parking lot, which will render the building unusable to the Folk Project for a period of 6 to 8 weeks.

The timing of that project has been up in the air for the past year. The original plan was to do the parking lot job last summer, but MUF was having difficulties in getting the plan approved by the Morristown Zoning Board. They have had several hearings at the Zoning Board to try to get the job done this summer, and finally got approval on June 6. There are several more legal steps that need to be taken. Depending upon how long they take, the job will commence either late this Summer or next Spring.

We have provisions for moving the Minstrel to an alternate location when construction starts. We have made arrangements to use the facilities of the **Presbyterian Church of Chatham Township** (the regular site of the Sanctuary Concerts Series) while we are displaced from MUF. For most shows we will use a 150 seat room there, but for shows with an anticipated high attendance, we will be able to use the big sanctuary where the Sanctuary Concerts are held. We anticipate there will be no interruption in the Minstrel's schedule. Keep your eyes on this space, or watch for a special email blast for the latest developments.
