She scores off the chart in intelligence, heart, instrumental and vocal chops, and enough charisma to make Radio City Music Hall feel like your local coffeehouse. She writes with the stylish craft of a Cole Porter and the spirituality of a Bob Franke. She plays sophisticated, effortless and perfectly tasteful accompaniment on piano and guitar. And she makes you feel a better person for having spent the evening in her presence.

Singer-songwriter **Zoe Mulford** plants one foot on either shore of the Atlantic, with homes in Pennsylvania and Manchester, England. Fri., Jan. 25: Joan & Joni



December monthly meeting called to order at 7:58pm at the Long Hill Tavern by President Steve Humphreys.

Meeting began with a singalong, Homeward Bound. Bob noted it only took us 40 years to realize we should start meetings with music.

Steve explained the new procedure for voting using colored index cards, and the change in the voting process from years past, designed to clear up a previously somewhat arcane process.

Motion to amend the Article IV, Paragraphs 1 & 4, that FP president no longer must be a trustee as well. Motion carried.

Monthly meeting adjourned at 8:06pm, Annual meeting began.

President's Report: Steve's annual report covered financials, the state of our venues and 2017–18 board initiatives aimed at keeping FP healthy and growing in the years ahead, financially and emotionally. Highlights: Lori led the effort to upgrade our insurance. We changed the bylaws to make them conform to NJ State law. The past two years have been the best in ten financially. We are a nonprofit; our goal is to have fun and support our venues, not make a big profit. As 85% of our revenue comes from admissions, we must keep our venues strong. Strategic investments were made in a new studio space and equipment for HSNOI and making OpenStage its own venue, both of which seem to be paying off. Robin Schaffer is studying our e-mail usage and aiming for greater cross-pollination among venues that are now completely separate lists. Steve will be stepping down as Trustee due to family health issues. He was given a well-deserved standing ovation for his great guidance during his two years as FP president.

Paul Fisher, Prez nominee, hopes to continue to work on professionalism and collegiality, be more outward-looking, and bring in more people. FP must work to stay relevant and get a bigger presence in the Morris County Arts community.

Treasurer's Report: We're a lean, mean music machine. 2018 was okay, not as good as 2017, but we're in the black.

Getaway Report: 2018 was a great success, with some exciting changes coming in 2019, including a beautiful new venue at Stony Point, NY, one hour north of Morristown. Mark & Robin thanked the steering committee. Getaway's \$3000 profit will be plowed back in to get even more wonderful performers and to continue building community.

Minstrel: Big slump in the first half of the year, but ended \$602 in the black after a strong slate in the last 6 months. Mike is hopeful that a very strong slate in 2019, including booking Getaway favorites and initiating advance sale tickets beginning with Susan Werner on 1/4/19, will continue to build revenue, with Gary Pratt helming the advance sales effort. Concert Window earned \$800 with half going to performers and half to Minstrel, an unexpectedly large windfall.

Swingin' Tern: Leigh thanked his large slate of stalwart volunteers who make the dance happen. Revenue was down somewhat this year, but several sponsored dances helped the overall bottom line.

Community Service: Highlights shared by Pat Brangs included several FP members volunteering to make music at a Memory Cafe in Morris Plains, for people struggling with dementia and cognitive issues, and a request for performers at a similar venue in Summit. Many cards for condolence, congratulation and get well were also sent.
